### "Build Something!"

A couple of years ago, a group of us were talking on the club repeater, and the talk got around to building stuff. One of the guys said, "You can't really build anything anymore." I almost fell out of my chair. That's simply not true. Heathkit may be just a fond memory, but there are still many companies out there selling kits that are not only fun to build, but are useful additions to the ham shack.

Here are a couple of sources:

- \* Elecraft ([www.elecraft.com](http://www.elecraft.com)). In my mind, Elecraft has become the premiere ham radio kit company, if not the premiere ham radio company, period. The new K3, for example, outperforms just about anything on the market by many accounts. Personally, I have built the KX-1, which is a real blast to operate from a park bench or to take on vacation. I also have and use the W1 wattmeter.
- \* TenTec ([radio.tentec.com/kits](http://radio.tentec.com/kits)). While perhaps known more for their ready-made rigs, they also sell a line of single-band transceivers and receiver kits.
- \* QRP Kits ([www.qrpkits.com](http://www.qrpkits.com)). QRPKits.Com sells kits that were originally projects of the Northern California QRP Club. My current General Class students are going to build the DC40A kit (\$40) as an exercise in building and as a way to learn about how radios work.

# A BIT FROM OUR GREAT LAKES DIRECTOR

### New ops: A curse or an opportunity?

The answer to the above question depends on each one of us. New ops are curses for people who prefer to "curse the darkness," but they are opportunities for people who would much rather "light one single candle" to clear the darkness. The darkness in these instances being the darkness of inexperience and ignorance. Note that I said ignorance; not stupidity. I am referring to a case of not having had the opportunity to learn rather than of being unable to learn.

I believe that all amateurs are inherently intelligent. Education to become knowledgeable is what we all need in one or more respects.

I fairly frequently receive e-mail complaining about how some new hams continue to operate using non-ham practices. This is particularly true when a group of several friends come into Amateur Radio from Citizens' Band at the same time. This is natural. They know each other well and may have operated on CB together using CB procedures for a long time. Long-established practices are often difficult to change.

Long-standing practices are particularly difficult to change when no one has shown that alternate practices are more appropriate. But, who is it that should introduce aspiring and new licensees to the ways of Amateur Radio?

The most logical people to show or teach newbies the "way of light and wisdom" are local hams. These are the hams who meet new licensees in person at license classes, club meetings and events, or at breakfast or lunch.

How do neophytes learn proper procedure? They could read on their own or could listen to established hams operate. The latter is a good way to learn, provided the hams they listen to use good procedure. Another excellent way to help newbies learn and to get them involved in a local club at the same time, is to present a short-course on proper operating. This course could be targeted strictly to new folks by adding it on as a single discussion or in few-minute bites during a license course. It could also be given at club meetings.

The training might include the proper use of pro-words and pro-signs, how to begin and end a QSO. It could stress courteous operating and prepare new hams to deal with the truly few LIDs who are discourteous and piggish, as well as other commonly-encountered features of day-to-day operation.

You might choose to open the training up to old timers. If you do, prepare to be surprised at the number of old timers who learn that practices they thought were correct, aren't. This is sort of like the King of Siam in "The King and I." Remember, he was the supreme honcho who suddenly realized that what he had thought was true for decades actually isn't.

As just one example of a highly common error, consider the all-familiar ending for Amateur Radio QSOs. Which is proper . . . 73s or 73? Regardless of the fact that nearly many new and old ops alike say 73s, this is incorrect. The correct term is 73. Don't misunderstand, saying 73s won't result in FCC enforcement action. It won't even result in a friendly reminder from an OO. Even so, if one really wishes to operate correctly, it is 73, not 73s.

The code term, 73, is already plural. It was initially set up by telegraphers to say "best wishes," "good luck" or similar thoughts to fellow telegraphers. Adding an "s" to 73 to turn it into 73s turns it into "best wisheses" or "bestes wisheses" or some other distortion of the language. At best it becomes a plural plurality, whatever this may be.

Not too long ago, I listened to a QSO on a local repeater in which two newcomers were debating the meaning of a few Q signals. Among other things, they were trying to figure out whether QRA means "I am at" or "there is a lot of interference," and whether QTH means "my call is \_\_\_\_," or "your signal is very weak."

New ops need help -- need an Elmer. It is best if the help comes from people who choose to take the effort to teach correct information.

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# "INTERESTING TIDBITS OF ANNIVERSARY INFORMATION" by David Spain (KC8GNU)

Here's some interesting information about the IARC, and area "Hamdom" in general, to compliment our radio club's 75th anniversary year celebration. According to Gordon Sponseller (N8BZ), the club's Hamfests were first held at the Naval Reserve building that used to be at the corner of Fifth Street and Ashland Road in Mansfield, which was a somewhat large place for the times. Amateur radio operators from all around came to the event, which was held on Friday in the daytime and evening. "Attendance was good, the format was the same as today, and Chuck Bookwalter's (W8QJF) wife would bake a big ham. So for a dollar to enter, you got all the coffee you could drink, and a big thick ham sandwich", he explained.

Since he lived in Bucyrus, Gordon first joined the Crawford County radio club, then got into our club in the early "50's", when he moved over here to Mansfield, and he has been a member ever since. Some of the first club meetings he attended, which were held monthly, were in Shelby, and others were held in Crestline and some of the smaller cities around Mansfield to oblige their operators, but "eventually it all moved to the second floor of the pavilion at North Lake Park, and meetings were held there for a number of years", he said. Gordon, who has his "Extra" ticket, was chosen "Ham of the Year" in 1974, and once served as our club's President, which he said was a matter of "coming up through the chairs", a sequence of elected positions, at that time

*(Note: Here's a very interesting side bar. When Gordon got his 'ticket' in January or February of 1947, his original call sign was "W8BZR". One day when I was browsing the internet, and by a total twist of fate and good luck, I stumbled across an article, with pictures no less, about a man named Robert H. Winchester, a ham radio operator, who lived in Watertown, NY, and later in Syracuse, NY. In 1921, at the age of 15, Robert got his first ham license, with the call sign 8BNY, and herein you will find a picture of his first station (circa 1922), a separate picture of his homebrew transmitter, and a picture of his antenna in the backyard of his house. Robert later changed his call sign to W8BZR. Can you believe it? I know I can't, and neither can Gordon).*

Back in April of 1951, a group of Mansfield area ham radio operators, most, if not all of them, members of our radio club, and their wives attended the first ever Dayton, Ohio, Hamvention. The group arrived Friday afternoon, and stayed over night at the Biltmore Hotel in Dayton, which was the headquarters for the event, attended the festivities on Saturday, then returned to Mansfield. Among the group was Cliff Odson (W8YGX),

Charlie Bookwalter (W8QJF), Jack Barr (W8VTP), John Armstrong (W8YCB), Elden Heck (W8PO), Milt Reed, Egan Loeckel, Floyd Myers (W8TTS), and Jerry Overinder (W8KUW).

According to Cliff, there were some booths open on Friday evening, and the Mansfield group had a good time at a now historic one-day event in the annals of our Nation's amateur radio history. Today, the Dayton Hamvention has to rank right up there as a major annual days-long event for consistently attracting visitors from, and to, our country.
